### GIVING THANKS UNTO GOD

With the coming of November, thoughts of thanksgiving and Thanksgiving Day quickly come to mind. If we are not intentional, though, our attention may quickly shift to Already, the music in department stores and Christmas. satellite radio are playing Christmas tunes! Giving thanks deserves a time of preparation and anticipation as well. Paul encourages us to be "giving thanks always and for everything to God the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ (Eph. 5:20, ESV). Hundreds of years ago the Pilgrims gave thanks for their sustenance and surviving another year. The abundance of everything around us should not be taken for granted. Even with inflation and hundreds of cargo ships waiting and having a hard time unloading their cargo, so much stuff is around us.

While Thanksgiving comes once a year, Paul reminds us that each and every moment is a gift from God and our hearts should be full of giving thanks, even though challenges also abound. Paul wrote this verse while he was unjustly placed in prison, and yet his circumstances did not define or control his faith; but what God has done for him and his belief that God had him on a mission and that his life had purpose. We don't even have to have external reasons to give thanks; we can always look within and realize how much God has also done for us! Jesus is our source for peace, joy, love, faith, hope, eternity with God, and meaning Sometimes we just have to get in the practice of in life! thanking God constantly for all of the little things in our life as well as for the relationships we cherish.

We go to the "advanced school of thanksgiving" when we start giving thanks for the challenges and hardships which come our way. We never know what God is doing behind the spiritual scenes as we learn to persevere and thank him as we take one step at a time and one moment at a time in our uphill struggles. Paul reminds us in Rom. 8:28 that God uses everything in our life for his good. We don't have to understand how something can be used for the glory of God; however, we have to be obedient as we go through the inevitable hardships which are common to our human existence.

### LIVING WITH JESUS THEN AND NOW THE SECRET CHRISTIAN

Sometimes faithfulness buckles under social pressure. Often our desire to serve God is relegated to the back burner when we are tested with political issues, personal agendas, material gain, and self righteousness. We vacillate between our need for control and our longing to be obedient to God's will. How often do we find ourselves wandering in the wilderness, lost sheep searching for the Shepherd, a paralytic waiting to be healed? Thank God we know we are sinners saved by the resurrected Christ.

Imagine Nicodemus: a learned teacher steeped in Jewish tradition, famous among his peers, respected within his community, yet seeking to fill a void in his spiritual life. In conversation with Nicodemus Jesus shows him the way to salvation and gives us the treasured Scriptural verse, John 3:16. This Pharisee's story is one of discovery and faith. Look at the powerful way Nicodemus is transformed in the love of Christ and given the ultimate blessing at the tomb: to prepare the corpse for its final resting place. Three days later, I doubt Nicodemus contained his joy of knowing the risen Christ!

#### Nicodemus, In His Own Words

Jerusalem city streets jammed with celebrants of the Passover Feast as I left the temple heading home, the chaotic scene I witnessed seared into my mind. An itinerant Rabbi named Jesus drove the money changers out of the court yard. Enraged with a whip of cords in His hand He lashed out at people, scattered animals, and overturned tables with coins flying through the air. This same Man performed miracles throughout the region restoring sight to the blind, cleansing lepers, and freeing many of evil spirits. I am told He brought the dead back to life.

Many times I stood among the people who gathered by the thousands to hear Him preach the kingdom of God. Jewish leaders queried and bated Him, hoping He would commit blasphemy. Secretly my friends including Joseph of Arimathea believed He is the Messiah, the Anointed One promised through the prophets. I had my own questions, but it was impossible to gain His attention in public. Disguised in a heavy cloak I walked to the house where He stayed after dark. He welcomed me into a small group of His devoted followers. The air was electric with the power of the Spirit. I knew I was in the presence of a Godly Man. Immediately I proclaimed my belief.

He told me I must be born again of water and the Spirit to see the kingdom of God. At first I did not understand. His words were poetic, piercing my soul. He reminded me of my duty as Israel's teacher, obligated to know and share the truth. He testified of heavenly things and eternal life, of light and dark, of truth and evil. His every word resonated within my heart. I bowed to Him, convinced He is the Messiah. I became a changed man when I placed my faith in Him.

The week before His final Passover was a blur. Jesus was tried as a criminal and sentenced to death by Pontius Pilate. The Jews could not kill Him themselves, but through manipulation of the people and customs they accomplished their goal. Jesus was crucified upon a cross and died.

Joseph of Arimathea was given Pilate's permission to claim His body. We gathered His lifeless corpse with tender care. A small procession accompanied us to a newly hewn tomb, one never used before in a nearby garden. In accordance with our burial customs we wrapped Him within spices and strips of linen. We performed our sacred rituals and prayed. Tears racked my body when we rolled the stone over the entrance. Centurions stood guard to make sure the body was not removed. I was not the only one drawn to His crypt. I recognized Mary from Magdala weeping by the entrance. Being near His tomb gave me comfort, yet provided little consolation for our loss. The One we believed to be the Messiah was gone.

When Mary continued her vigil on the third day, she found the tomb opened. Jesus spoke to her, having risen from the dead! Frightened out of their wits, the guards dropped their weapons and abandoned their post. His words from that night in the house where we met echoed in my ears: "Open your eyes and see! Open your ears and hear!" Everything has fallen into place, just as the prophets predicted.

Now I understand. Now I know. Now I am bold to speak His name: Jesus Christ!
