



LIVING WITH JESUS THEN AND NOW ZACCHAEUS

Fame and fortune mean nothing to God who is Master and Creator, for all things belong to Him. The outer trappings of wealth and status never sway His judgment or favor. No one buys his way into heaven. There is no monetary price for forgiveness, for its price is a repentant and meek spirit, a contrite and humble heart saved by the precious blood of Christ.

This is the lesson Jesus presents in the Parable of the Pharisee and the Tax Collector in Luke Chapter 18. In the very next chapter He enters Jericho and encounters the tax collector, Zacchaeus. Tax collectors were reviled by Jews because they made their living gathering tax money for the Romans. More often than not they added in a fee which they kept for themselves.

This was Jesus' final journey to Jerusalem where He would be crucified the next week. Imagine Zacchaeus, a very wealthy man, whose only desire on that day was to see the Master. By reason of faith his life changes completely. Here now is his story, in his own words.

The Man Who Climbed a Tree

Another warm day begins as I prepare to walk into the poorer section of Jericho, my home town. Next week is the holy Feast of Passover, so I must increase my efforts collecting taxation for the Romans. That will appease them before our celebration. I doubt the people will thank me for a few days' respite from my haranguing. Nevertheless, it is my job since I am the chief tax collector in this major trade city. Wealth has its rewards, yet something is missing in my life. I have everything money can buy, but I am not a happy man.

A crowd is forming along the main thoroughfare. I guess it is another caravan passing through, camels loaded with spices, fabrics, and gold led by strangers from faraway lands.

Someone hollers, "Jesus is coming!" I have heard of this Man, a Rabbi who teaches and heals. Some call Him the Messiah, the promised Anointed One while others say He is a blasphemous ne'er-do-well. Soon I am surrounded by people taller than me, for I am short in stature, another reason for their derisive remarks. I must see for myself who Jesus is.

I spot a sycamore-fig tree down the road and run ahead of the masses. The low lying branches make it easy for my short legs to climb. I ease my way up to a secure vantage point, biting into a small fig as I wait. And here he comes!

The Man is surrounded by people pressing into Him. He carries Himself with authority and grace. He stops when He sees me and calls me down as He invites Himself into my home. I scurry down the tree, almost falling, delighted to welcome Him, gladly accepting Him. At first I am at a loss for words as people mutter about Jesus choosing to be the guest of a sinner.

Yes, I am a sinner, eager to speak in my defense. Here is my opportunity to publicly confess my sin, to atone for my past behavior, to cleanse my heart and soul. I am grateful to give up half my possessions to the poor and pay back anyone I have cheated four times the amount. I am relieved to repent of my sin, and I call Him Lord. A heavy burden has been lifted from my shoulders.

He came into my home, reclined at my table, and called me a son of Abraham. My wife and I served Him and His disciples our best food on our finest tableware. We offered Him all we had and rejoiced in His presence. He spoke of God's kingdom in parables. And He blessed my house with His salvation. I am redeemed by the Lord and this life changing experience. For He chose me, plucked me out of a tree, to serve Him.

For the first time in ages I felt a deep internal peace which passes all understanding. He gathered my children into His lap and blessed them. Then He left to Jerusalem in preparation for the Passover. I never saw Him again. I heard He was sentenced to a horrible death on a tree. And then He arose from the grave to prove He is the Son of God.

A tree. He saved me out of the sycamore-fig and now has saved the world from His own tree, the cross. I share my story with anyone who will listen, eager to glorify and honor His holy Name: Jesus.
