Mollie Polhemus

Introduction by Jean Stinnett

One look at Mollie Polhemus tells you she is a happy person. When her lips are not smiling, her eyes are. Mollie leads a Praise and Worship session combining music and prayer each Saturday evening at the Anglican Church of the Good Shepherd. For nearly an hour the Holy Spirit dwells among 6-15 attendees.

Mollie is president of La Gran Familia, an organization in Cuauhtemoc, Chihuahua, Mexico providing an orphanage and school for needy children established at the church built by Glenn Polhemus in 2001. A nonprofit entity receiving 40% of its funding from individuals, LGF has made impressive progress over the years: the care of needy children caught in absolutely desperate family situations, remarkable scholastic successes (2 registered nurses, 1 engineering graduate, 1 MBA in tourism, and 30 high school graduates since 2001-- in Mexico being a high school graduate is a big deal), with literally tons of food to feeding ministries in Harlingen, Eagle Pass and El Paso. Mollie remains a strong advocate in this ministry writing articles for the monthly newsletter, fund raising, delivering food to border communities, and as a strong prayer warrior.

Mollie inspires others to seek the Lord in song, service, gratitude, and prayer. She embraces life's challenges head-on with a proactive mindset. Her joy is contagious, drawing people toward her to discover what might be her secret to happiness. Here it is, revealed in her own words.

I am often surprised by my joy and happiness. I am almost always happy. I think happiness is responsible for one's perception of the things we go through in our lives. Changing my focus from "Why me" to "Why not me" has energized my entire attitude and filled me to the brim with happiness.

Ten or so years ago I met a couple who had moved to San Angelo to live with a family member because the business they owned many states away had crashed. How were they going to live? They were very concerned and not very happy.

The husband came to me one day in the church parking lot. He said, "I just do not understand! Why did this happen to me? Why me?"

I immediately said, "Why not you? These things happen all the time. You can say why me or say why not me. Things just happen." This dear sweet family chose "why not us" and happiness came into their lives. Their bad situation brought a far better scenario into their lives. They were soon in their own home with new jobs they loved.

"Count it all joy, my brothers, when you meet trials of various kinds, for you know that the testing of your faith produces steadfastness. And let steadfastness have its full effect, that you may be perfect and complete, lacking in nothing."

It was discovered during an annual mammogram test. Before I even walked out the door a physician came up to me and said, "You have breast cancer." I was shocked. I wasn't expecting that but that is what it was. My first thought was not "Why me," but "Why not me? This happens to lots and lots of people and I just happen to be one of them." After the first surgery a cancer nurse came to my room and gave me what looked like a carpenter's apron. It had relatively small pouches sewn on the front of the apron as places to put the drain bottles. It was a miracle. It was so easy to manage. That was such a blessing! Blessings come in strange and unusual ways. Since that day I have made one hundred aprons for those women attached to drain bottles after surgery. Making an apron always puts a smile on my face.

In November of 2020 my very active husband, Glenn, died in his sleep while taking a nap after a 5-day driving trip. I could not and would not say "Why me?" With tears in my eyes, I said, "Why not me?" This will happen to all of us sooner or later. Glenn is home in heaven, and I have 53 years of wonderful memories to keep me happy.

Glenn and I married August 22, 1967 and immediately began moving: to Virginia where he served in the Navy aboard the USS Pocono, then to several cities in Texas where he worked in ranch management. We started our family of four children, two of our own and two we adopted. In 1984 Glenn was ready for a change. The last item on his bucket list was to attend seminary, so we moved to Pennsylvania. After one year in Trinity Episcopal School for Ministry he realized his calling was to minister directly to the poor. We moved back to San Angelo where we worked side by side at the San Angelo Feed Yard for 27 years. There, his service to the Lord flourished.

Glenn's compassion for the Mexican people and culture developed into a ministry. Having graduated with a business degree from the University of the Americas in Mexico City, he had the necessary people skills and connections. He volunteered to build and repair churches in Mexico and established La Gran Familia orphanage and school in Cuautemoc. Glenn managed the priest's finances in the US sending money as needed. When the priest's heart attack was ruled an accidental death, the insurance policy Glenn secured for him provided \$70,000.00 which was reinvested in real estate. Proceeds from this investment continue to fund La Gran Familia to this day.

When the San Angelo Feed Yard sold in December 2012, Glenn reinvented himself as a correction officer, substitute teacher, and tutor to non-English speaking students and their parents. Again, I volunteered along side of him. Our marriage was not spent staring into each other's eyes. It was like Mollie and Glenn each on a horse moving side by side in the same direction.

Glenn had grown up in the Episcopal/Anglican church but there came a time when we decided to look elsewhere and see where God was working. Very quickly we realized St. Mary's Catholic Church was where God was leading us. We were there nine years before being called back to the Anglican Church of the Good Shepherd. Then, 34 years after attending seminary, Rector Father Hal Scott told Glenn it was time for him to be ordained! In October 2019 he was ordained a deacon and on August 9, 2020, an Anglican priest. His strongest callings were outreach and good sermons.

The happiest time of my life was Glenn's rosary and the funeral service. The Rosary was led by Deacon Mike Lopez. There were many people from St. Mary's and Good Shepherd and other churches. They were all part of one big family. Many stories were told about Glenn's time at St. Mary's. There was so much laughter, love and happiness that I still feel it today. During our years at St. Mary's we went every week for nine years to a Wednesday night Bible Study with five other couples. These faithful couples led the rosary by taking parts in the readings.

The next morning was Glenn's funeral. The church was filled with a beautiful body of love and thanksgiving for Glenn's entry into heaven. The closing hymn was *La Montana* played on the guitar by Tomas Alvarez. The English translation of the song *La Montana* is "a mustard seed can move a mountain." It raised the ceiling. It was so awesome.

Happiness is the essential element in changing negative experiences into positive ones. A "why not me" attitude allows me to receive God's joy in whatever situation comes my way. Every challenge is a new opportunity to serve Him.




